## Elephant POOPOOPAPER PARK

The Elephant Poop Paper Park is located in the Meilin area of Chiang Mai. It is an environmental protection park that processes elephant poop into paper. The elephant poop in the park is not only fertilizer, but also the raw material for making craft paper. In this park, you can not only buy paper made from elephant poop, but also visit the production process of poop paper, and you can also participate in the production yourself.

## Bua Thong Waterfall

Sticky Falls, also known as Bua Thong Falls, is a unique natural wonder located near Chiang Mai, Thailand. What makes this waterfall special is that the surrounding rocks are unusually grippy or sticky, hence the name.

Unlike regular waterfalls, where the rocks can be slippery due to algae or moss, the rocks at Sticky Falls have a porous structure that creates friction, allowing visitors to climb up and down with ease. It's almost like climbing up a giant natural staircase made of limestone.

The reason the rock is "sticky" is because calcium carbonate and minerals have been deposited over time. These minerals create a surface that feels rough to the touch, similar to sandpaper, and provides excellent traction even when wet.

Visitors can enjoy a unique rock climbing experience at Sticky Falls, where they can climb up the cascading tiers of the waterfall and swim in the natural pools formed by the flowing water.
